## Tex -Mex Gran Prix Tour

Francois Remillard is an old friend of mine, and we worked together at the Canadian Gran Prix, where he is the Clerk of the Course. I had suggested that we go to the Us Gran Prix in Austin Texas, and he said that Mexico was the week after, and we should do both. So, off we went. First stop was Austin.

The COTA track is very impressive. The first corner is 13 stories up from pit lane. We walked the track, and it is a good thing that it was the first corner, if we had to climb that at the end, we may not have made it.

When we arrived on Friday, we went into the spectator entrance. We were amazed to find how many good viewing points there were in the General Admission areas. So for most of the weekend we just watched from those areas. They even have free shuttle buses to take you anywhere around the track.

The only disappontment was that there were only 2 support events: Masters Historics and SCCA Formula 4. We went into the Support Paddock and found some old friends. Teena Larson is running an F4 Team "Kiwi Racing" with her dad Mo. The two F4 races were great, with over 30 cars. Teena's drivers were 3rd \& 5th in the first race, and 2 nd \& 6th in the second.

For the Gran Prix, the organizer gave us grandstand tickets. We were at corner 15 , so we could see the end of the back straight and the technical section before the long triple apex corner. It was an exciting race, with Hamilton \& Vetle dueling for the lead, and Max Verstappen flying up from the back.

On Monday, we had some time, so we checked out the riverfront park in Austin, and saw the Stevie Ray Vaughan statue. Then we went to San Antonio for lunch (about 1 hour drive.) There we went to the Riverwalk (like the French Quarter in New Orleans, but around a canal.)

Then it was off to Mexico City. The traffic there is crazy. There are 25 million people in the city, and I think half of them were on the road at anyone time. Every intersection was like the start of a race, with 4 or more cars going for 2 lanes. People make turns from any lane, and the don't have stop signs, just giant speed bumps. So we hired a driver to take us around. Thankfully, Francois speaks pretty good Spanish.

The track is right in the heart of the city, only a few blocks from our hotel. It is another impressive venue, with the incredible stadium section, surounded with a 30.000 seat baseball stadium. Every seat was filled.

We got tabards so we could go trackside, and walked around the track (several times.) Our credentials were from FIA, so I think some of the marshall thought we were spies for the FIA. But they were all very friendly, and keen.

There were 3 supports series here: Masters, Mexican F4 and the World Championship Porsche GT series. For F4, ther were 16 cars with great dicing, especially in the midfield. There were over 30 Porsches, with lots of spins and passing.

The F1 race looked good with Vetel, Hamilton and Verstappen all going for the lead. But at Corner 3, Vetel and Hamilton made contact, and both had to pit. Hamilton had to limp around to the pits with a flat, and fell right to the back. For a long time, he ran last until the next tire stop, when he started to move back up. At the end he had a great battle with Alonso (would have predicted that), and finally p[assed him, and got enough points to secure the Championship.

One of the most impressive points in the race was on lap 19. The nineteenth was the date of the eartquakes in Mexico. All the spectators stood up and put their fists in the air for the whole lap. This is their
symbol for keeping Mexico strong. There is a lot of poverty in Mexico, but the people are extremely proud of their country.
